V-Past Perfect

- I. The form of the past perfect [Had + PP]
- II. The use of the Past Perfect:
- 1- We use the past perfect to show that something happened before a specific time in the past.
 - e.g. By 1988, Oprah Winfrey had become famous.
 - It was 1985. she had already been in a Hollywood film.



- 2- The past perfect is used to show a relationship with another past event. We use the past perfect with the earlier event whereas the past simple for the later event.
 - **e.g.** In 1990, Oprah **invited** Matt on the show.

He had been an author for two years.

This means (he was an author before 1990.)

e.g. By the time Jill **got** home, 'The Oprah Winfrey Show' **has finished**.

Be carful! In sentences with When, notice the difference in meaning between the past simple and the past perfect.

- **e.g.** When the show ended, she left. (First the show ended then she left) When the show ended, she had left. (First she left . Then the show ended)
- 3- Words such as: already, yet, ever and never are often used with the past perfect to emphasise the event which happened first.
 - **e.g.** I saw <u>an elephant</u> last night. I had never seen it before. Jason <u>had already seen</u> it.
- 4- We often use the past perfect with 'by' to mention a certain point in time in the past to say that something was completed before that point.
 - **e.g.** By 1966, Oprah had decided on a career.
